## Dear Friends,

Many thanks, again, go out to the community and staff members who served on the Kindergarten Task Force. We are very excited to offer full-day kindergarten starting this Fall! Even with this lawsuit being filed against the District, we have kept our focus on our
 students and our classrooms, and the Board decided not to spend more money on lawyers than on kids - the lawsuit didn't have any merit, but we realized very quickly that proving our case in court would cost more than the tuition itself, and that didn't make sense for any of our stakeholders. The School Board considered dropping the full-day option to solve the lawsuit; but the Board ultimately went a step further, and voted to keep fullday and to drop the tuition charge, instead.
To be sure, we still have fiscal concerns to manage. There are looming issues (such as pension reform and school funding reform) that are threatening school budgets throughout the State. Today, though, we are redoubling our efforts to ensure that offering full-day without tuition will not impact any other District programs.
Again, I would like to thank all the members of the Task Force for their tremendous work, and to thank the countless other members of our community who have supported the District in this initiative. Our first priorities are always to offer the best programs we can while managing the District's limited resources as wisely as possible. We are looking forward to an exciting school year coming up!

## Student Leadership Team

In addition to the activities of our Student Council this year our District also created a Student Leadership Team (SLT), which was comprised of middle school students. The purpose of the SLT was to create a select student leadership group to promote and assist with various school activities that address the IL Social Emotional Learning Standards that builds school community. The students were selected to participate and had to meet the following criteria: 1) maintain ' $C$ ' grades and above, 2) behavior
 is in good standing, 3) must inform teacher in advance if they miss class for an activity, and 4) must make up any missed work on time. Parental permission is required, students sign a contract of expectations and they rotate the leaders within the team quarterly. The inaugural SLT membership included the following students:

Feedback to the Board of Education from the SLT noted that the experience was life changing for the students regarding leadership and teamwork skills that they acquired. Likewise the staff observed many positive benefits not only for those students who were in the SLT but also those students who were recipients of their good works. The enthusiasm after year one ensures that the second year will be off to a good start.

## STEM Education

The middle school students will have a new experience when they enter the former computer lab in the fall. This summer will begin its transformation into a STEM lab. Students will be challenged to design and publish video games using Construct 2 software. They will also utilize problem solving skills to create amusement parks, as well as try their hand at robotics. The STEM lab will include 3-D printers for students to use as part of the Designing and Prototyping module. Our younger students will also be able to explore STEM, which is woven into the inquiry lessons and labs of ScienceFusion, the science series by Houghton Mifflin Harcourt we are piloting in the fall.

As we celebrate the end of another successful school year for our students we are bombarded with news stories about the inappropriate use of the internet as well as school violence. ## From The School Board President, Bob Brown

Learning is the primary focus of Winfield School District 34. While this certainly applies to the students in our classrooms, it also applies to the rest of our district. Our teachers, staff and administrators spend a lot of time each year learning new techniques and best practices to become better at educating the children of Winfield. Many days, when the children have a half day or day off from school, the teachers, staff, and administration are hard at work perfecting their craft. The learning doesn't stop there. Even the school board spends time learning how to be better board members and become better equipped to handle the decisions, policies, and problems that they face within our school district. Most school board training is run by the Illinois Association of School Boards (IASB). This training covers the basics of school board governance such as how tax levy's work, how to manage a school budget, how to govern by policy and the relationship between the school board and the superintendent. It also covers topical issues like contract negotiations, common core curriculum, innovative ways to integrate technology into

education, how to prevent and respond to issues of bullying, and many more. This training usually takes the form of an all-day class on a Saturday, an online class or a weekend in November at the School Board Conference in Chicago. All of our board members participate in training in addition to the time spent on board responsibilities. In addition, as a testament to the amount of time that our board members spend learning how to be more effective at their work, two of our members are recognized as IASB LeaderShop Academy Members (Lynn Kammes and Deanna Mustafa) and one is recognized as an IASB LeaderShop Academy Fellow and IASB Master Board Member (Bob Brown). It requires a commitment of time and dedication to serve on a school board. It takes more time and dedication to participate in learning opportunities to become the best possible board member. I want to recognize that the members of our school board are committed and dedicated to do whatever it takes to serve our community and the children in our district with excellence. It is a privilege to serve with them.

## SUMMER SAFETY TIPS FROM THE WINFIELD POLICE DEPARTMENT

## - "Hang Up or Hands Free" phone law

- Effective January 01, 2014, House Bill 1247 prohibits the operation of a motor vehicle on any Illinois road while using a mobile phone or electronic communication device.
$\square$ Remember to always keep your garage doors closed even during the day while you are at home and keep your vehicle doors locked at all times. Residents have been victims of burglaries due to unlocked/open property.
- Impaired Driving - while it is illegal to drive with a blood alcohol concentration of .08 or greater, driving ability can be impaired below the legal limit too. If you plan to drink, designate a non-drinking driver.


## - Playground Safety - Check all

 playground equipment before letting kids play on it. Surfaces that are too hot may cause burns, loose or unsecured ropes or chains can cause accidental strangulation and proper playground surfacing materials can reduce the risk of head or severe injury in the event of a fall.Water Safety - Most drowning and near-drowning incidents happen when a child falls into a pool or is left alone in a bathtub. Supervise children playing in and around water, and for preschool age children, practice "touch supervision", where you are only an arm's length away at all times. Adults should not be involved in other distracting activities, such as mowing or on the phone, while supervising children in or around water. Even where lifeguards are present, children should be supervised and also exercise the buddy system in water.

If you own a swimming pool at home, install a four-sided pool fence that completely separates the pool area from the house and yard and clear the pool and pool deck of toys. Remove visible floats, balls or toys from the pool area immediately after use so children are not tempted to enter the pool area unsupervised.
$\square$ Sun/Heat Protection - besides the immediate effect of sunburn, long term sun exposure can cause skin cancer, eye damage and heat illness - Wear protective clothing, a hat, sunglasses, sun screen and stay hydrated.
Do not leave children or pets inside a car. The temperature inside a vehicle can rise to 25 degrees ABOVE the outdoor temperature therefore causing a green-house effect. Children are more sensitive to heat than adults and quickly can lose the ability to cool their body temperatures down; therefore leading to dehydration, heat stroke, seizures or even death in these conditions.

Bicycle Safety - bicycle helmets reduce the risk of head and brain injuries in the event of a crash. Also following the bicycle rules of the road, wearing fluorescent or reflective clothing and activating lighting can improve visibility while riding a bicycle.

Pedestrian Safety - Teach children to walk and not run across the street, always cross with an adult and avoid running out from inbetween parked cars. When crossing the street, try to make eye contact with drivers to insure they see you and use sidewalks when possible and hold your child's hand near moving and parked cars. School aged children should always travel with a buddy - never walk alone.

Summer First Aid Kits - Every family should have an easily accessible first aid kit at home and in their vehicle while travelling. The kit should also include emergency numbers, dentist and doctor phone numbers, poison control number and current prescription information for all family members.

Planning for Emergencies, Storms or Evacuation - MAKE A PLAN! Learn about disasters, discuss your plan with your family and prepare. Know how to shut off your utilities and keep a fire extinguisher in your home. Build an Emergency Kit - water, food, flashlight, battery operated radio, medications, family contact information, cash and pet supplies if you have a pet. Practice your "shelter in place" plan at home and have a reunification place should family get separated during an emergency or disaster.

## Dog Ownership and Bite Prevention -

 work with a local shelter, rescue organization or a reputable breeder - they can often help you find breeds that will be a good fit for your household. Be sensitive to cues that children are fearful of a dog. Dogs with histories of aggression are not suitable for households with children. Never leave infants or young children alone with a dog and don't play aggressive games with your dog.If attacked by a dog, resist the urge to panic or run, this may make the dog feel more confident to attack if it senses fear. Do not make eye contact, but command the dog to back away. If the dog continues to attack, attempt to defend yourself by making contact with or kicking the nose or throat area of the dog, while yelling for help. If you fall or get knocked to the ground, protect your face, chest and throat hydrated.

Lawn Mower Safety - Only use a mower that stops the mower blade if the handle is let go. Always use eye protection while mowing and prevent injuries from flying objects by picking up all objects prior to mowing. Children under the age of 12 should not operate a mower. Do not allow children to ride as a passenger while operating a ride-on mower and keep children out of the yard while mowing. Always turn off the mower and wait for the blades to stop prior to removing the grass catcher, unclogging the chute, crossing gravel areas or walking away from the mower.

Sign up for "Smart911" - Sign up for Smart911 and create your own Safety Profile to give 9-1-1 valuable information about yourself, family members, your home, pets and even vehicles that will automatically display on the 9-1-1 call taker's screen when you make an emergency call. It's private and secure and you control what information is in your profile. These details can save valuable seconds or even minutes during an emergency.
No one plans to call 9-1-1, but you can plan ahead by signing up at www.smart911.com today

Teach children how to call 911 - in case of an emergency or for police or fire response.
