## Dr. Kell

## Sports \& Activities

## Garden Club

The Garden Club consisted of nine students and was directed by Mrs. Angelacos. They met once or twice monthly for the entire school year. Much work was done to beautify the grounds of our schools. Mr. Wilson (kindergarten parent) of Wheaton Mulch donated his time and plants while Proseks donated flowers. The students cleaned, trimmed and planted throughout the year and they even created a butterfly garden!

## Engineering Club

Mrs. Cori Nelson instructed twenty $3^{\text {rd }}-5^{\text {th }}$ graders for our first Engineering Club. During the six-week program, students were assigned tasks to learn the basics of engineering that would help them create a final project. For their final project, the students were required to design a trap for an invasive toad in Australia. The traps had to be set from four feet away to avoid the poison that the toad can shoot.

## Art Club

Mrs. Eaton sponsored the Art Club. There were three sessions of Art Club, 7 weeks each. In each session, our goals were to use the extended time to create wonderful works of art for ourselves and for our school community. The first session included nineteen $3^{\text {rd }}$ and $4^{\text {th }}$ graders. The students created
over-sized ornaments as decorations for the Holiday Music Spectacular as well as color-filled paintings inspired by an animal of their choice. The second session had seven $6^{\text {th }}-8^{\text {th }}$ grade students. As a group they designed, problem-solved and painted the tall trees that were used as the forest in this year's drama production Camp Omigosh. Students in this second session also painted with acrylics on canvas, created one-of-a kind compositions inspired by their own photo - taken in the school with the iPads. The third session of Art Club wrapped up the year with seventeen $5^{\text {th }}$ and $6^{\text {th }}$ grade students. They each molded, designed and glazed unique bowls and plates - fired and ready to eat off of! They also chose to make a card for a child or family at Ronald McDonald House or they worked in groups to create a poster meant to inspire other students. The posters are hanging around the building.

## Chess Club

Chess Club met for 10 sessions and included thirtysix $2^{\text {nd }}$ through $5^{\text {th }}$ grade students playing at the beginning or intermediate level. We also had twenty middle schools students who volunteered as chess coaches and managers. Beth Nelson, math teacher, sponsored this club and because of the success of the club, Stephen Rogers, teacher, was added on
to help with the high number of students who joined. The season ended with a club tournament that was well attended by both chess players and their families.

## Drama Club

Mr. Wdowiarz directed thirty-five students in this year's performance of Camp Omigosh. This year Kaitlin Kilgore won the inaugural Winfield District 34 Drama Club award for her outstanding effort in the club in all of the four years she was eligible. Kaitlin not only was a strong actress in all four years of performances, but also contributed greatly doing both make-up and set design. She and the other $8^{\text {th }}$ graders will be missed. Next season will be the first season on record where the $8^{\text {th }}$ grade class of actors and actresses will choose the production. Look out for next year's performance in the spring!

## Volleyball

The twenty-four players on the girls Volleyball teams both had tremendous success and heartbreak this season. Mrs. Honaker noted there was an incredible improvement amongst the girls in both individual skills and how they played as a team. The Varsity team ended their season with a heartbreaking loss in the conference tournament

## Basketball

The boys' basketball team had twenty-three players this year and was coached by Mr. Leisering, Language Arts teacher.
JV Basketball: For their first time playing together as a team, the Junior Varsity boys built a solid foundation for next year. They lost in the second round of the tournament, but they competed in each game. They were always vocal and supportive of their teammates, and they worked hard to improve every day.
Varsity: After winning the championship last year, the boys had high expectations for themselves. Although they fell short in the tournament, the boys competed hard every game, and they learned good lessons about responding to adversity.
Mrs. Honaker coached the fourteen girls on the Winfield girls' basketball team. The team demonstrated a great deal of dedication and hard work throughout the duration of their season. With only seven girls on each team, these players
were asked to go above and beyond sometimes playing in games with no breaks. Their hard work definitely paid off as the Varsity team ended their season undefeated and with the title of Conference Champions. In addition to this, our very young Junior Varsity team showed unbelievable growth and have definitely laid the groundwork for a promising future for girls' basketball teams here at Winfield.

## Cheerleading

Most of the squad joined in the $5^{\text {th }}$ grade and have continued through the middle school years. This made our team strong in numbers, which allowed them to progress quickly in learning new skills and routines. This year we would like to congratulate Emily Bramos who has already made the West Chicago HS D94 Cheer Team for FY18. Emily began cheering for Winfield when she came to us in the $7^{\text {th }}$ grade and will continue that cheer spirit now in high school. This squad works very hard each season and continues to represent Winfield School in a spirited and positive way!

## Track

Our middle school Track team consisted of twenty-six students with coaches Mr. Kahlfeldt and Mr. Rogers. The athletes did a good job taking advice and learning events, getting and staying in shape, and performing well at meets. Even with our small size and mostly $6^{\text {th }}$ graders, we were able to get first place in some events at meets (like the mile/ 1600 m and Shot Put) vs bigger schools with many $8^{\text {th }}$ graders. For the first time in a long while, we were unable to run a conference meet, but we did go against Avery Coonley (the only other SEAC conference school with a Track team) at the Mooseheart meet. We are very fortunate to have good relationships with non-conference schools to get invited back each year. This year, we had meets scheduled vs Westmont Junior High School, Lisle Junior High School, Benjamin, and Franklin Middle School at Wheaton North High School, Monroe Middle School at Wheaton North High School, Mooseheart Academy, and Stratford Junior High School at Glenbard North High School.
